Jean Paton Lovell

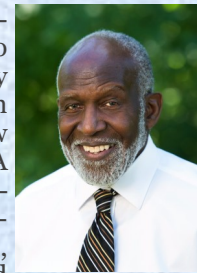


Can one person change the world? If her name is Jean Patton Lovell, the answer is yes. Mrs. Lovell was born in 1896 to a progressive family that believed in education. One of three daughters, Jean graduated from Smith College and looked forward to her bright future. Deeply effected when she lost her fiancé in WWI, she focused her efforts on ending the war and promoting peace. While teaching at Hillhouse High

School in New Haven during the 1950s, Jean realized that she had many students who had the ability to attend college but lacked the finances. Working to rectify that situation, she founded the New Haven Scholarship Fund in 1959, a natural next step from her involvement with students at the Yale International Center. She was bringing her work for peace and understanding home. Believing that education was the key to world peace, Jean gathered others who shared her vision. By the time of her death in 1998 at age 102 the New Haven Scholarship Fund was firmly established.

So how did she change the world? Her energy, wisdom and vision have provided over 10,000 students with the possibility of college, and the number grows each year. Her example has inspired others like Mr. Jim Barber (featured here), to take up her cause and move it forward. Her dedication has allowed generations who have no direct knowledge of her the opportunity to improve their lives and the lives of their families. The greater New Haven community has benefited dramatically from this incredible individual. Yes, one person can change the world!

James Barber



Known universally as Coach, James Barber has provided dedicated service to Southern Connecticut State University (SCSU), its students, the New Haven Scholarship Fund and the greater New Haven community for over 60 years. A record-setting hurdler as a student-athlete, Barber went on to become a successful Owls coach for over 43 years, training numerous track champions and many All-American athletes. His expertise led him to coach both the men's and women's USA track teams at national & international championships.

In 1971, Barber launched Southern's first Summer Educational Opportunity Program, successfully opening the door to a college degree to scores of students of color. He also led the University's Affirmative Action Office, served as Director of Student Supportive Services for over 20 years, and continues to help advance Southern's mission as Director of Community Engagement.

A committed community activist, Barber founded New Haven's track and field outreach program for young people, working with more than 4,000 children and youth over the years.

Since 1968, Mr. Barber has served as a long-time officer and member of the all-volunteer Board of Directors of the New Haven Scholarship Fund, serving as President for over 10 years. When he was accepted to SCSU years earlier, he did not have the finances to purchase his books and considered withdrawing. Referred to Jean Lovell by a friend, Mr. Barber was awarded one of the original scholarships offered by Mrs. Lovell and was then able to purchase the books needed for \$82.50 to continue to pursue his education. From humble beginnings of only \$800 dollars awarded to eight SCSU students in 1959, the NHSF awarded \$539,750 to 153 first year and 81 multi-year scholars attending over 51 in-state and out-of-state schools last year.

In a citation honoring Mr. Barber in 2016, Former CT governor Dannel P. Malloy said, "Unsurprisingly, you are a legend in New Haven, having inspired and mentored generations of city youth. At Southern, your influence, both on and off the field, has impacted students and alumni nationwide, many of whom said they would never have graduated without your support and guidance."

Moving quietly and without fanfare, Mr. Barber continues his lifetime work with young people and serves on the Executive Board of the New Haven Scholarship Fund and as the Director of Community Engagement at Southern.

The New Haven Scholarship Fund lost a good friend, leader and longtime supporter when Rocco Orlando passed away on January 6, 2022. At age 94, Rocco was devoted to many things, but his family, heritage and his love of education were among his passions. Coming from a New Haven Italian family, Rocco was very aware of the way he and his family were perceived by many in the larger world. He lived his life reflecting his great pride in his background and heritage. His involvement in the Italian American Historical Society and his contribution in the creation of the Ethnic Heritage Center at SCSU were evidence of his beliefs. Convinced that education was the way to advance in the world, he devoted his life to the pursuit of learning. His professional life took him from teacher to principal to superintendent. He achieved a PhD in Education Law and served as a professor and program head at SCSU. His involvement with the New Haven Scholarship Fund as a Board Member, Vice-President, President and life-time supporter were logical extensions of his commitment to education.

While his background and education were very important to Rocco, the light of his life was Rae, his wife. She was his partner, his soulmate and his inspiration. He named the Orlando Family Scholarship in her honor after her passing.

Rocco certainly left the world a better place. He will be missed.
